Scott Wilson – Libz President.

Now that the leadership of both the political and administrative wings of the party reside here in Helengrad, it has been decided that monthly Executive meetings now be moved from Auckland and are now held here in the capital.

Leader Bernard Darnton and I form the core of this Executive, which also includes the supremely competent Nik Haden as Treasurer, with assistance from Wim Verhoeven.

Being based in Wellington will more easily facilitate access to Parliament, including making submissions to Select Committee (Libertarianz has this year presented submissions on the Architects Bill; the Films, Video and Publications Classification Amendment Bill and has forwarded a submission on the Foreshore and Seabed Bill). It also provides a central geographic focus, so that membership in and attention to the South Island can grow. The Auckland Branch will remain as vibrant as ever, and be able to focus on activism in that region.

Recently the Party's focus was on standing a small number of candidates at local body elections. We were aiming to build membership and participation and raising our profile. I'd like to congratulate all of the candidates, Stephen, Tim, Rob and Bernard, and the unofficial libertarian candidates in the BoP - on an excellent effort and a big step forward.

Exposing hundreds of thousands of New Zealanders to Libz candidates, and earning literally thousands of votes has been enormously encouraging, and should demonstrate to people in Auckland, Hamilton and Wellington that we are here - and we are standing on principle.

Our candidates displayed a mixture of styles, as you'd expect with a party of individuals. Stephen campaigned in high-profile Auckland race that focused on 3 candidates, and came a close 5th. A bit more effort and earlier start could have easily made that 4th. However, now with Auckland City Council swinging to the left with Hubbard, the nonsense of big local government will be with us once again in Auckland City.

Tim and Rob, had many competitors in Hamilton but still delivered a clear message, and with it increased the numbers that voted for Libz candidates at the last general election. They did a great job, and raise awareness of Libertarianz principles exponentially.

Bernard Darnton - our Libz new leader – ran a low profile campaign; nevertheless, I personally encountered quite a few Wellingtonians who said they were impressed enough by his clarity of purpose and ideals to vote for him. And so they did.

Also, let us not forget the Bay of Plenty Libz - Jason Yule and Russell Watkins – who gained excellent support in one of the fastest growing regions in the country.

This IS a platform to build upon - we have far more voters this

time than we did in the general election, and now we need to translate this into membership and momentum.

My aim is to have Mayoral candidates in the main centres each election, and regional council candidates if possible. Even if all that happens is that, like Bernard, we have someone who stands and responds to media enquiries and puts a profile up with the website in order that people know we exist and what we stand for.

Yes, we have a long way to go, but this experience has been helpful in continuing the development of our campaign teams!

Let me remind you of what we face: the ACT party is falling apart. Their National party allies, despite their invigorated leadership, are still vocal supporters of Nanny State –advocating for example law reforms that promise to reverse the burden of proof; and still refusing to countenance abolition of the hated RMA.

But the lack of parliamentary opposition is our opportunity, and for Libertarianz the implosion of ACT is a godsend since it leaves space in the market for a principled party of freedom – that is, us - to be heard and to attract support. It has never been more important for those of us opposing the socialists *on both sides of the house* to make ourselves heard, and to attract financial and membership support from those of like mind.

There is only one TRUE advocate of small government and freedom in New Zealand, It is the Libertarianz Party and we need your help. We offer you in return our honest effort.

The State of the Nation

This year sees the 20th anniversary of the election of the Lange Labour Government and the beginning of the most significant political change in New Zealand's history since 1935. For NZ, 1984 was the opposite of Orwellian.

It is a moment to celebrate the commencement of widespread economic liberalization: the floating of the exchange rate; elimination of import licensing; elimination of industry subsidies and protectionism; massive restructuring and privatisation of government trading entities; and the abolition of large swathes of industry-specific regulation. It was an exciting time to be alive, and economically we enjoy today the fruit of that liberalisation.

It is also a time to celebrate the end of the ethos of Muldoonism: decades of tinkering with protectionism; massive state spending on bogus projects; ever-growing and long-calcified bureaucracies; and hopelessly inefficient state 'trading' departments [Not to mention innovations like car-less days, wage freezes and running up gargantuan overseas debts to pay for all of the above – Ed].

It was, however, also the beginning of the insidious political correctness that would take over our education, health and

judicial systems: the withering of the defence alliance with the United States (and nuclear scaremongering); the advance of the anti-human 'deep ecology movement; the release of the virus of ethno-nationalistic tribalism; the rise of the Feminazis and the establishment of the Ministry of Wimmin's Affairs; the jack-booted ooze of the 'take-no-prisoners' Inland Revenue Department; the explosion of government as a proportion of GDP; and the enshrinement in law of politically-correct perversions such as smoke-'free'; cultural safety; the "principles of the Treaty of Waitangi," and the overwhelming culture of victimhood.

Today, political correctness flourishes and economic reform has halted (and in some cases has been reversed). New Zealand is, as a result, is more business-friendly than it was twenty years ago, and many things that used to be 'government-issue' are now better, cheaper and offer more choice. Twenty years ago the New Zealand Party promised Freedom and Prosperity and with it won 12% of the vote and ended the reign of Muldoon. Let's see if a REAL freedom oriented ticket can get a fraction of that in 2005.

Act of cruelty to property owners

Peter Cresswell, an Auckland architect, is a member of the Libertarianz Party . He is responding to the view of Green Party co-leader Jeanette Fitzsimons that concern about the RMA is based on myths and fear.

Project Aqua cancelled; new prisons delayed; the Waikato upgrade of SH1 delayed by taniwha; plans by American giant Weyerhaeuser for a timber processing plant in Nelson shelved; a homeowner in Waitakere jailed for cutting down his own tree; marine farm applications left in limbo until at least the next decade ...

Pederson says: "It's little, not large, that suffers most RMA pain." The strangling of smaller projects by red tape is no longer news; it has become a daily occurrence.

The problems are so obvious that they have been noticed even by the Government. The good news is that it reviewing the act. The bad news is it is not a review that is needed; it's a stake right through the act's heart.

National, Act, Labour, and the Greens all agree the RMA needs change. But not one will stand up and admit that the only possible solution for this monster is immediate euthanasia.

The real problem with the act is not that it is unclear, restrictive or has gone beyond its original intent - although all of this is true. It is that its intent is anti-property rights, and anti-human. At the heart of the act is the idea that trees, rocks and mud puddles all have rights - but humans do not.

In its 456 pages, the phrase "property rights" does not appear. Instead of the idea that made common law so successful for more than 700 years, the heart of the act has the ecobabble of "sustainable management" and "kaitiakitanga" and the lunacy of "intrinsic values".

The act also, of course, contains the obligatory treaty babble. When doing anything more aggressive than mowing your lawn, you "shall take into account the principles of the Te Tiritio Waitangi" - and to this day we have yet to find a court willing or able to explain precisely how that might be done.

So, what does all this mean for the average citizen? First, it means he can no longer rely on infrastructure being there when he might want it. But it also means his property is no longer his own; his home is not his castle.

Let's say you own a small home on an even smaller site, and you want to extend your carport to accommodate something more sizeable than your grandmother's Morris Minor.

In most instances, that means you will have to sit down in your local council offices with a person fresh out of planning school and talk seriously about whether the extension is a "sustainable use of natural and physical resources" - at which point you will begin start scratching your head.

Or, whether it will "safeguard the life-supporting capacity of air, water, soil and ecosystems" while "avoiding, remedying or mitigating any adverse effects of activities on the environment".

If you are not sure, you could assess whether or not your proposed new parking stall "pays particular regard to kaitiakitanga [or] the ethic of stewardship", to "the maintenance and enhancement of amenity values", or to "the intrinsic value of ecosystems". At which point you either

run screaming from the planner's office, or pick your jaw up from the floor and write out a cheque proportional to the amount of nonsense about to be put into a report arguing such things on your behalf.

So, you hire a consultant to write that report of meaningless phrases. Meanwhile, objectors hire other consultants to say that your proposal is not a sustainable use of resources, and won't safeguard ecosystems.

Eventually you all end up in the Environment Court, and the one with the biggest pile of nonsense in front of them wins - after which the lawyers and consultants go off to lunch at Antoine's; you go off to take out a new mortgage; and the consultants' reports go off to a landfill.

The fact is the RMA does not protect property rights. Neither does it protect the environment, as cases like the polluted Rotorua lakes and Tarawera River show.

It gives money and power to planners and consultants while destroying both property rights and the environment.

Without protecting property rights, you cannot protect your environment. That realisation has resonated through the common law. Sadly, with the introduction of the Public Works Act and the various town planning regimes, it has been largely ignored for nearly half a century.

Where we once observed the common law limit for nuisance that "one may not use one's property in such manner as to injure that of another", the RMA declares we may not use our property except with the express permission of the state.

You may do only what a council district plan considers you should be allowed to do. With that, a basic legal and constitutional protection is overturned: that people could do anything they liked unless it was illegal, whereas the government could do nothing at all unless they were empowered by law to do so.

That basic concept of jurisprudence has been turned on its head; local governments may now do anything they like (expect, of course, build infrastructure), whereas in respect of the RMA we ourselves can only do on our own property what a plan says we can do.

The last review of the Resource Management Act took nearly five years, and did nothing but waste everyone's time. This latest review is little more than an electioneering sop.

And what might another review do anyway? The same people will say the same things they said before, and nothing of consequence will be done to change anything.

The solution is simple. Don't tinker with the procedures for acquiring a resource consent. Don't tinker with the Environment Court. Don't recraft the RMA. Don't streamline it; don't fix it or reform it.

Instead, drive a stake through its heart. The RMA review team must reinstate the common law protection of property and environment - and then get out of our way.

The problem with the RMA (including Nick Smith's proposed revamp) is that it leaves ownership in the hands of the Government.

Let's say you own a stereo - you can use it however you want, and the Government can only step in to stop you if you're harming other people (for example by playing loud music late at night, or illegally copying music). If you first had to beg permission from the Government every time you wanted to use that stereo, then you wouldn't own it in any meaningful sense. The same applies to resources, including land and buildings, covered by the RMA.

The RMA represents nationalisation by stealth and must be repealed and replaced with common law, not merely rehashed.

“Assistance for the Apathetic: Statist Ratings for Candidates”

Libertarianz Mayoral Candidate Stephen Berry blames a narrow focus by mainstream media for a lack of knowledge about the different options in the Auckland Mayoral Elections, and consequent voter apathy. Berry says, "Reports show only a race with three candidates - there seems to be a situation of 'picking favourites' when there is in fact smorgasbord of options on offer."

"When an election is presented as a three-horse race it should not surprise anyone that more than half the voters take no interest," says Berry, who argues that if voters were served up the whole platter of options they'd be more willing to browse the possibilities and participate.

He points out for example that "for the first time in an Auckland Mayoral election, a candidate with an alternative to expanding government is running for Mayor." Libertarianz' Stephen Berry is, he says, the only candidate advocating a reduction in local government. As such, he has compiled a "helpful analysis of all the mayoral hopefuls in order to display the difference between himself and the rest of the pack and hopefully to inform those who have missed the rest of the line-up."

A "statist rating" has been included for each candidate - no stars indicates a commitment to rolling back local government as far as legally possible; five stars indicates a commitment to enormous expansion.

John Banks - Perhaps the 'lesser-evil' of the statist pack. Banks has kept rate rises below inflation, eliminated council debt and sold pensioner housing and Auckland Airport shares, but he has yet to tackle his council's thuggish administration of the Resource Management Act. He has also been a major force for conservatism with for example his support for massive restrictions on prostitution, and as a leading advocate of liquor bans. *Statist Rating: 3/5 Stars.*

Stephen Berry, Libertarianz - "Because you are the owner of your own life, you have the right to live it as you see fit on the condition you respect the right of others to do the same. I support voluntary interaction among individuals, individual freedom and personal responsibility. I am committed to slashing rates, council spending and the bylaws that restrict personal sovereignty. I am opposed to public funding of the Eastern Motorway, support letting prostitutes run their business like any other, and I respect the right of property owners to do what they wish with their land without violating the ownership rights of others." *Statist Rating: 0/5 Stars.*

Felicity Coggan, Communist League - Coggan advocates a 'government of farmers and workers,' the abolition of capitalism and a revolution modeled on Cuba's. This would equate to the

state controlling your day-to-day activities and imprisoning dissenters, and the residents of Auckland boiling up stones for soup. *Statist Rating: 6/5 Stars.*

Christine Fletcher - Floundering round in a morass of 'consensus politics', Fletcher tries to please everyone and ends up pleasing no-one. Fletcher wants to sink ratepayer funds into public transport not currently wanted by the public; to maintain public ownership of assets; and to fund an assortment of events in the name of 'diversity.' Specifics not being her strong suit, she gives no specific indication of potential rate rises, but they'd need to be large to accommodate her plans. *Statist Rating: 4/5 Stars.*

Dick Hubbard - Despite being a poll leader and the campaign now nearing its conclusion, like the rest of Auckland (and probably Hubbard himself) I have little idea what Hubbard stands for. He claims to be an 'unashamed futurist' with a 'vision' for Auckland in 50 years. One can only assume that government will expand on futuristic proportions to accommodate his vision. Also a Helen Clark toady, and a member of the hand-wringing Sustainable Business Network. *Statist Rating: 4/5 Stars.*

Phil O'Connor, Christians Against Abortion - It's always been a matter of confusion to me why CAA only seems to show up in the local body contests where they cannot stop abortion. O'Connor's faith that 'with Jesus, all may be achieved,' explains his failure to attempt a high profile campaign, and pretty much describes his theocratic aspirations. *Statist Rating: 4/5 Stars.*

John Osborne, Aotearoa Tenants Party - Hard to tell whether this guy is serious or not. Basically a supporter of the status quo with a few pet projects to satisfy his enthusiasms for playing trains. Oddly, no mention of tenants. *Statist Rating: 3 Stars.*

Daphna Whitmore, Anti-Capitalist Alliance - The looniest offering, even with all the competition further up the list. With all the fashionable hatreds of the unwashed 'anti-movement,' Whitmore espouses economic stagnancy, an all-powerful militant unionism and a tight grip on every form of enterprise. *Statist Rating: 7+ Stars.*

Berry concludes, "I hope this guide will be useful for some of those who haven't yet put pen to ballot and those who are looking for an alternative to the constant expansion of council. I certainly hope this guide makes very clear who is standing for your freedom and who is just a different shade of sprawling statism."

“New Zealand Held to Ransom by Mahuta Blackmail”

"New Zealand is reeling in a Constitutional crisis," says Libertarianz Spokesman to Deregulate Maori Affairs Tim Wikiriwhi, who slams the Select Committee hearing on the sea-bed and foreshore. "The legal status of the sea-bed and foreshore ought to have been determined under common law by the Privy Council, instead of being the political football of party politics as it is now," he declares.

"As a direct consequence of Clark's and Wilson's meddling we now have tribalists like Nanaia Mahuta applying their apartheid leverage to keep New Zealand perpetually in bondage to the Waitangi Claims industry with such nonsensical doctrines as "inalienable customary title". Wikiriwhi says Mahuta's demands that the committee consider "inalienable customary title be granted to Maori" and for the bill to "include a clause to protect all current and future treaty settlements" is pure black mail. "She is holding our nation to ransom knowing Helen Clark would love to keep her on side to retain a foothold in the Maori electorate."

Mr Wikiriwhi said the Libertarianz submission on the sea-bed and foreshore (available at www.libertarianz.org.nz) is in "direct contrast to Mahuta's tribalism, because the submission accurately correlates the facts of history to the current debate." Mahuta, he says, is not only trying to dupe New Zealanders by lying about history, but by seeking to further cement the idea of 'inalienable customary title' held tribally she will only perpetuate and increase the very inequities of communal ownership that have kept tribal Maori back!"

PRESS RELEASE: Education - FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE.

“You Want Education? Then Damn Well Seize it!”

"PPTA president, Phil Smith seems to lack the ability to understand the underlying cause of many problems facing the education sector," says Libertarianz Spokesman For Education Deregulation Peter Osborne.

In the present scenario Mr Smith begrudges the lack of government funding for schools to maintain their current educational standards. "This is one of many issues that have plagued the education system for over a century and the story remains the same today." Osborne asks, "Why is it that common belief would expect things to improve with further funding when history has consistently shown otherwise?"

Mr Smith is also calling for the Ministry of Education to undertake an independent investigation into the true funding needs of schools. "Hardly independent then is it!" says

Osborne, "Does Mr Smith expect a favourable outcome as a result of this investigation?"

Mr Osborne cuts to the chase, "Wake up New Zealand. Nothing will improve until New Zealand parents take responsibility for their own offspring instead of allowing one politician and an army of bureaucrats to decide what is learning and what is not. How can parents expect their children to be taught in a one-size-fits-all State-run education system where competent teachers have no more recognition than do their incompetent colleagues?"

This is why we have such a large proportion of teenagers leaving school who lack the personal resourcefulness to find their own way in this world. We then wonder why we have such high youth suicide and violent crime rates."

He continues, "This is apathy in its worst form. While the State uses compulsion to achieve its own ends, parents seem only too willing to hand their children over, and teachers seem content to peddle whatever clap-trap the Ministry of Education directs them to."

Mr Osborne concludes, "Since the state won't be releasing its grip any time soon, if they wish things to change then parents and teachers must seize full control of their responsibilities. If parents want choice they will only find it in a competitive free market. If teachers want real recognition of their skills and if they wish to teach what they know to be fact, then they will have that opportunity only in a competitive free market. Quangos like the PPTA can make their recommendations but in a free society no one would be forced to either adhere to or pay for their wish-list. Other than Libertarianz, there is not a single political party who would willingly allow people to live freely. Only when the removal of the State from education is achieved will people start to understand what a farce we have been forced to follow all these years. What a waste"
